Pilkington Jackson Tableaux

Those of you who have visited before will, no doubt, have seen the works of prominent 20th century sculptor Pilkington Jackson, in the Dark Gallery on the first floor of the museum. Our Conservator, Lesley Scott, has been working with award-winning Edinburgh-based Sculpture Conservators Graciela Ainsworth. This is in order to prepare the works to be moved off site for conservation. The conservators will be carefully cleaning, consolidating and repairing missing areas on the tableaux, so that we can re-display them in our new museum.

The process of unveiling the tableaux from their sturdy encasements (dating to the opening of the museum in 1929), has shown us the extent of the artist's mastery, the details and colours of the original scheme. We've uncovered sections on the right and left hand side that were previously covered by the casing. Visitors will be able to see it all and see them up close in the new display, exciting times!

We are very pleased to be working with Hamilton Design Ltd on our pop-up exhibition, which will be touring around Scotland over the next 12 months.
